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A Brief History of Meharry Medical College

Founded in 1876 in Nashville, Tennessee, **Meharry Medical College** began as the Medical Department of Central Tennessee College and became the first medical school in the South for African Americans. Its origin lies in an act of kindness: **Samuel Meharry**, aided by a freed Black couple after an accident, pledged to support education for African Americans, inspiring the Meharry family to fund the school.

The first class enrolled 11 students under the guidance of co-founders **Dr. William J. Snead** and **Dr. George W. Hubbard**, who served as the first president, with classes initially held in a church basement. By the late 19th century, Meharry expanded to include nursing and dentistry programs, setting a precedent for comprehensive healthcare education for underserved communities.

Over time, the college introduced four-year medical training and added the **School of Dentistry** in 1886, the **Graduate School** in 1938, the **School of Applied Computational Sciences** in 2021, and the **School of Global Health** in 2023. It also established **Hubbard Hospital**, becoming a hub for clinical training and research.

Influential figures shaped its legacy, including **Hulda Margaret Lyttle**, who advanced nursing education and secured national accreditation; **Dr. Matthew Walker**, who founded Meharry's surgical residency and the Matthew Walker Comprehensive Health Center; and **Dr. E. Perry Crump**, who championed pediatric care and studied health disparities.

Visionary presidents such as **Dr. Harold D. West**, the first African-American president in 1952, integrated the student body and expanded programs; **Dr. Lloyd Elam** oversaw major campus growth and introduced Ph.D. programs; and **Dr. David Satcher**, later U.S. Surgeon General, created the Institute on Health Care for the Poor and Underserved.

For nearly 150 years, Meharry has trained thousands of African-American physicians, dentists, and researchers, remaining steadfast in its mission to eliminate health disparities, serve vulnerable populations, and advance equity in healthcare through education, research, and community engagement.

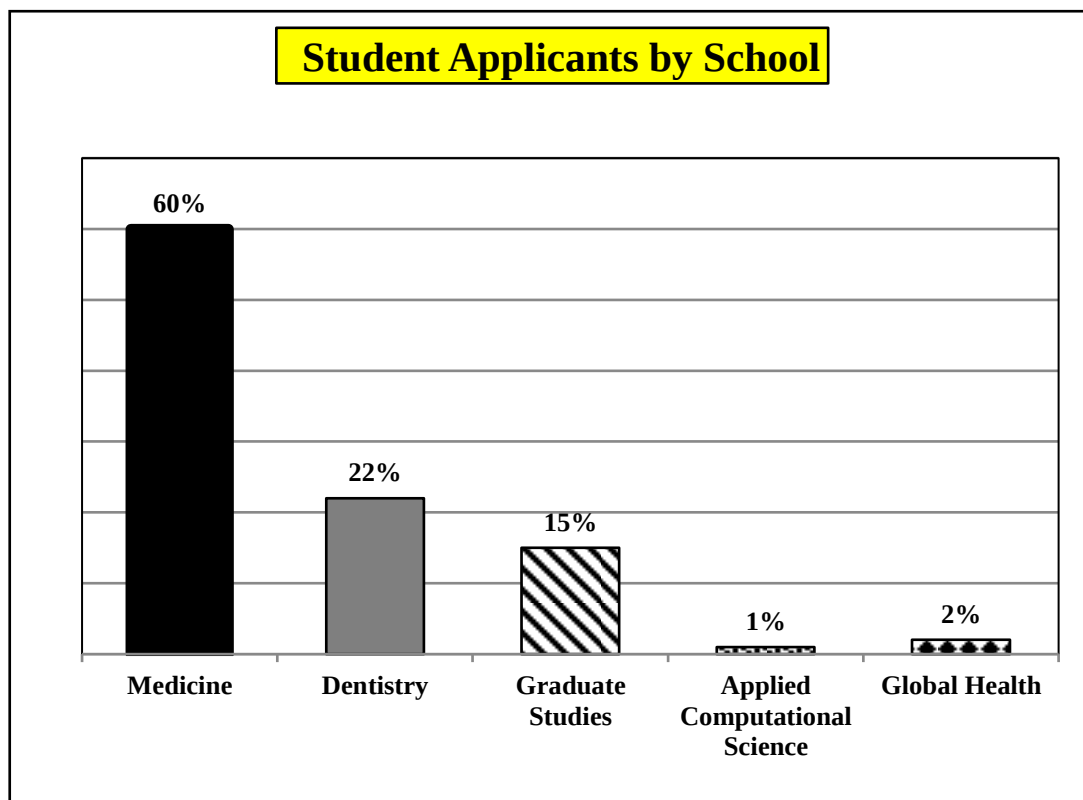

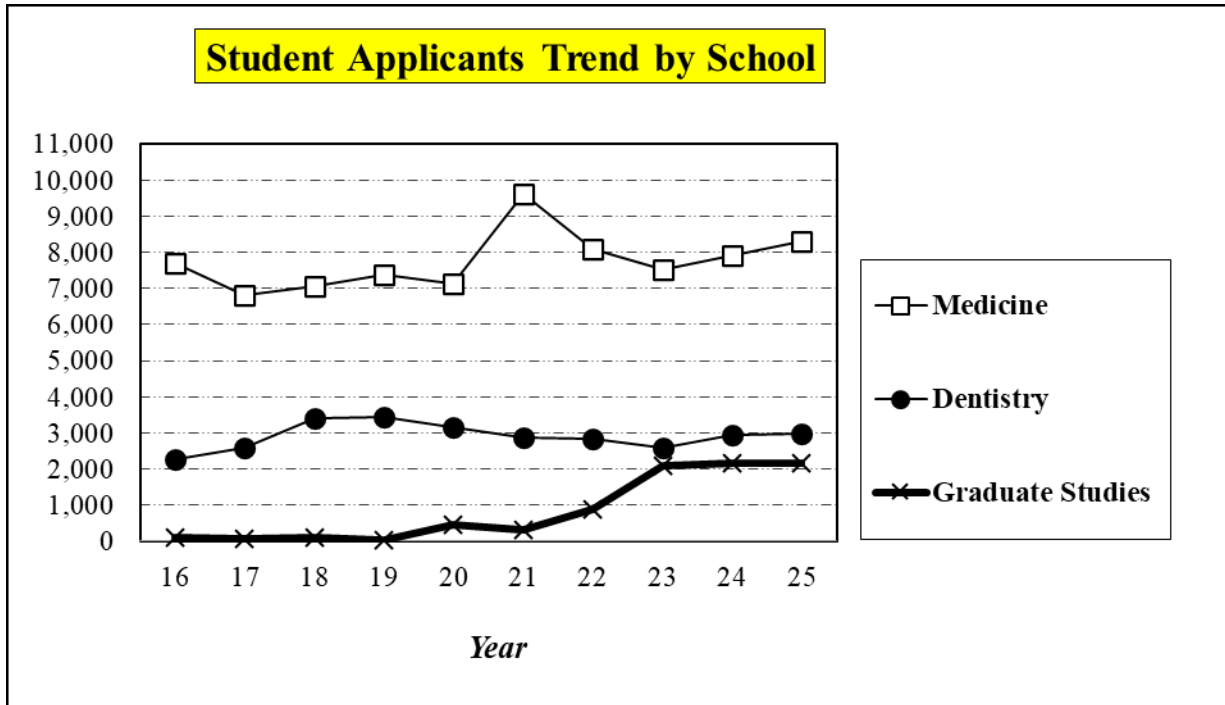

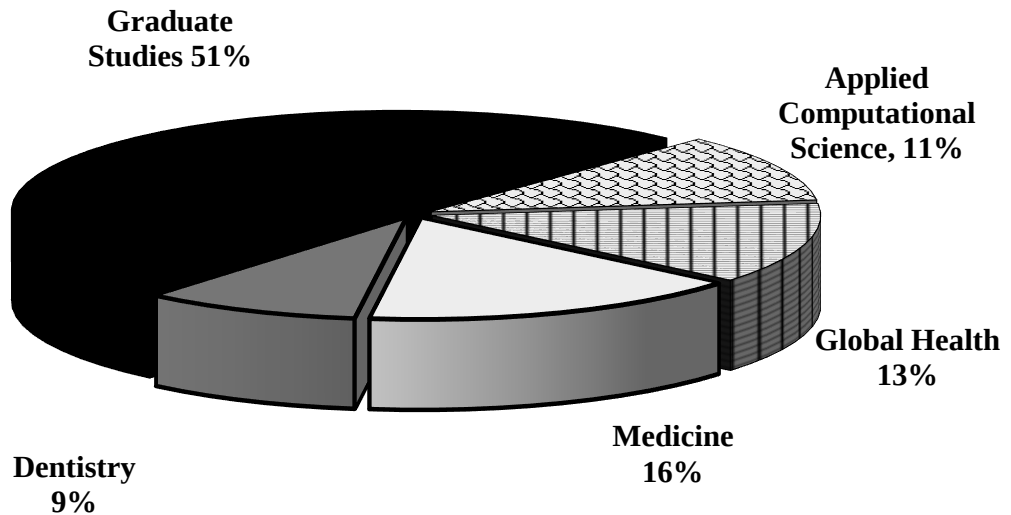

Admitted First-Year Students by School

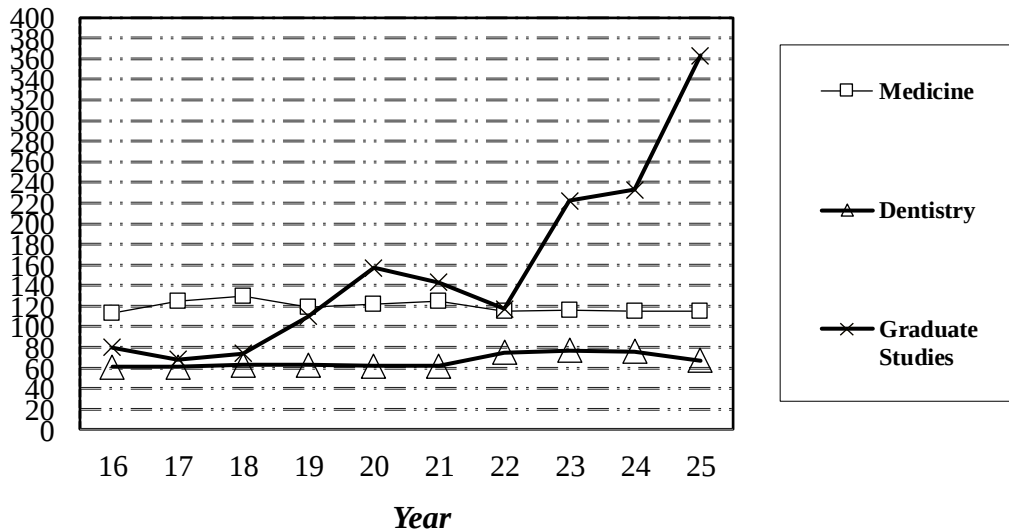

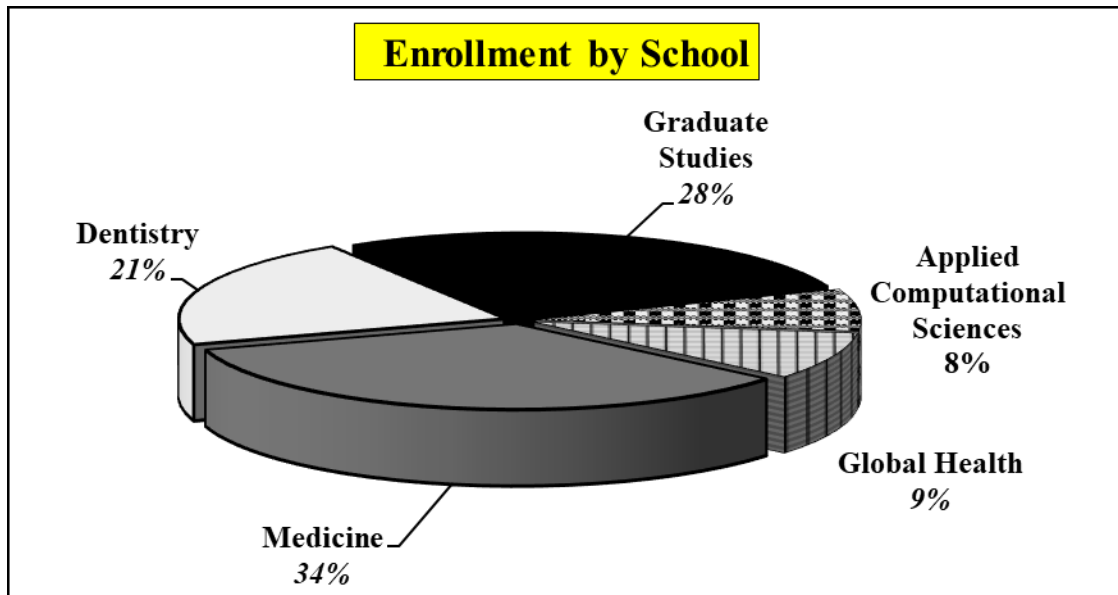
Admitted First-Year Student Trend by School

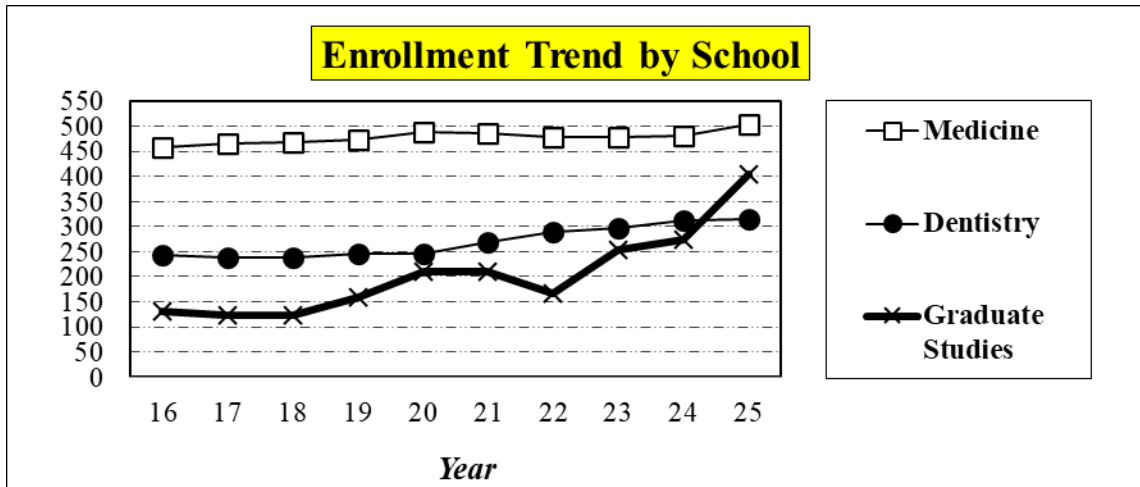

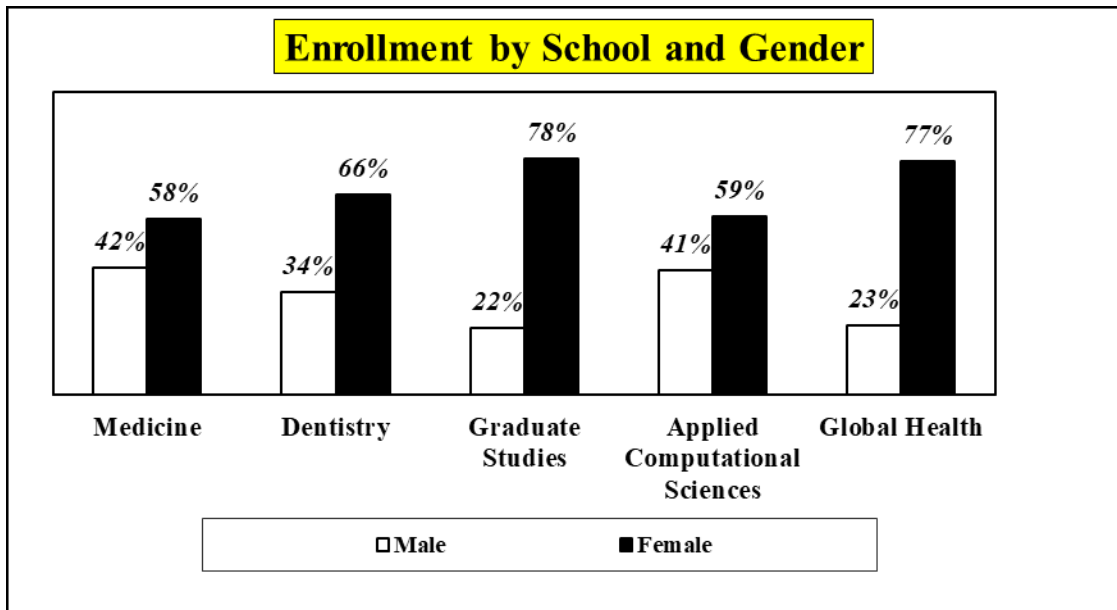

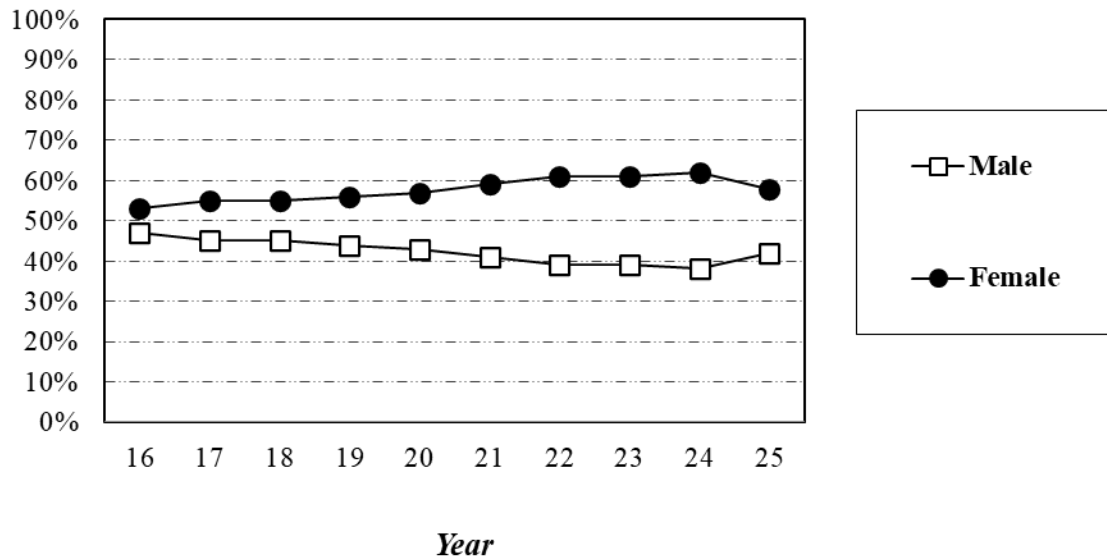

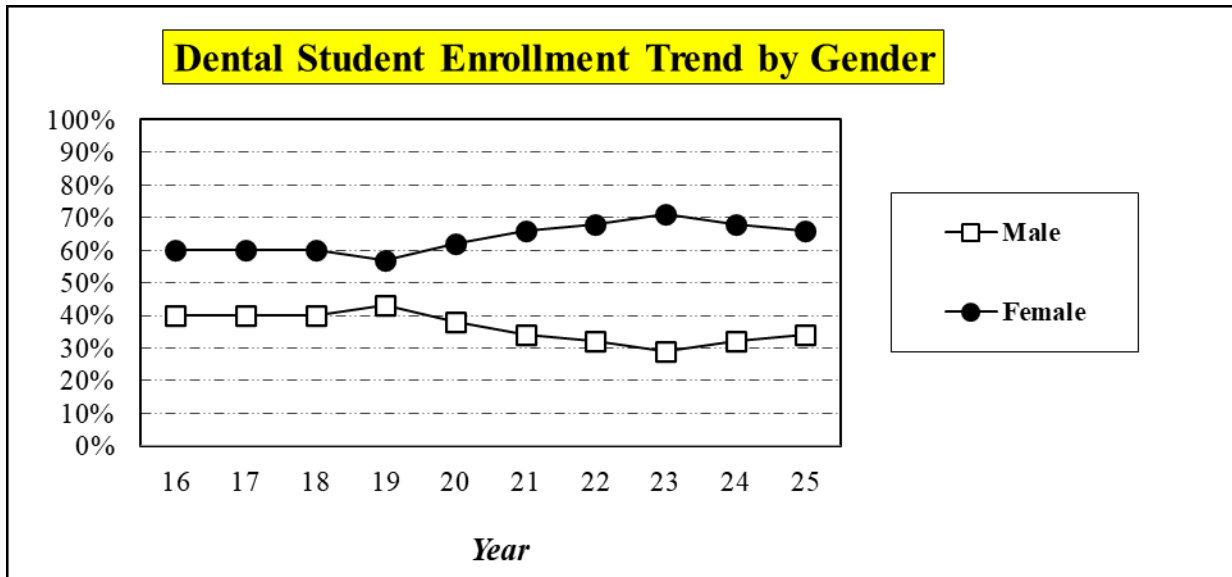
Medical Student Enrollment Trend by Gender

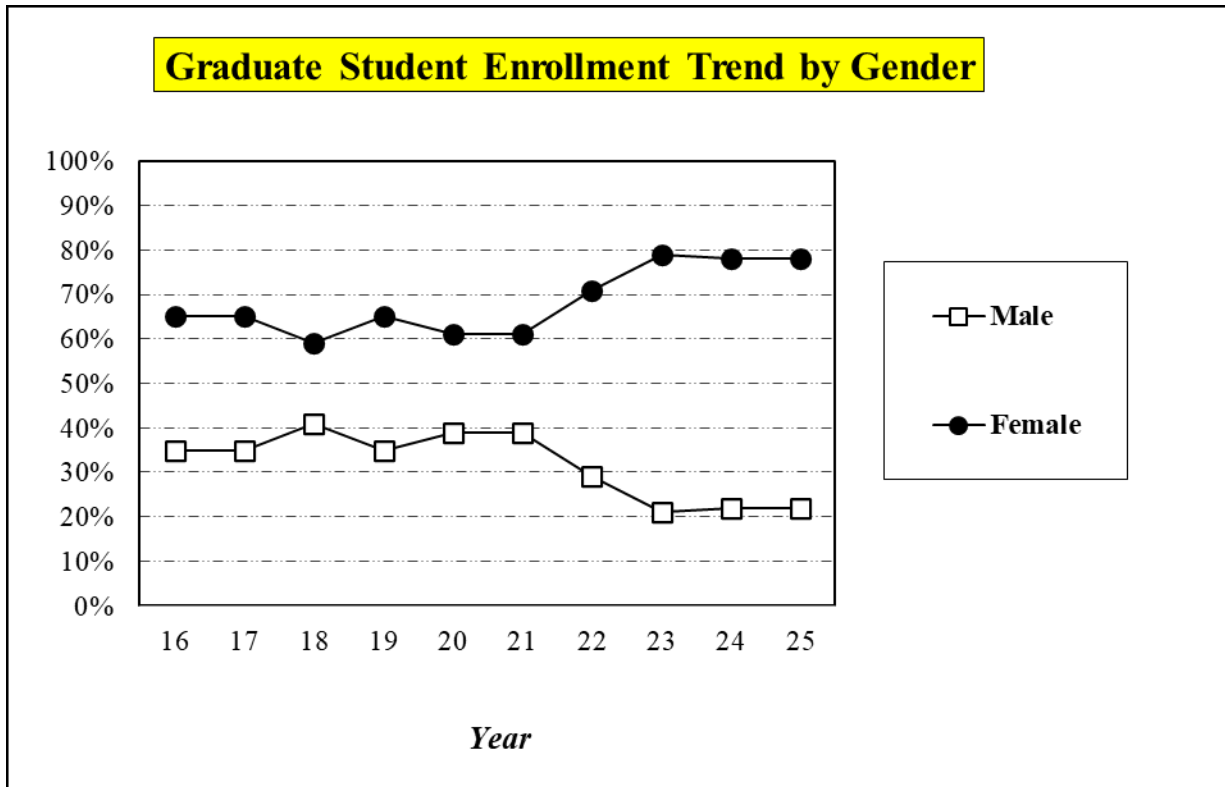

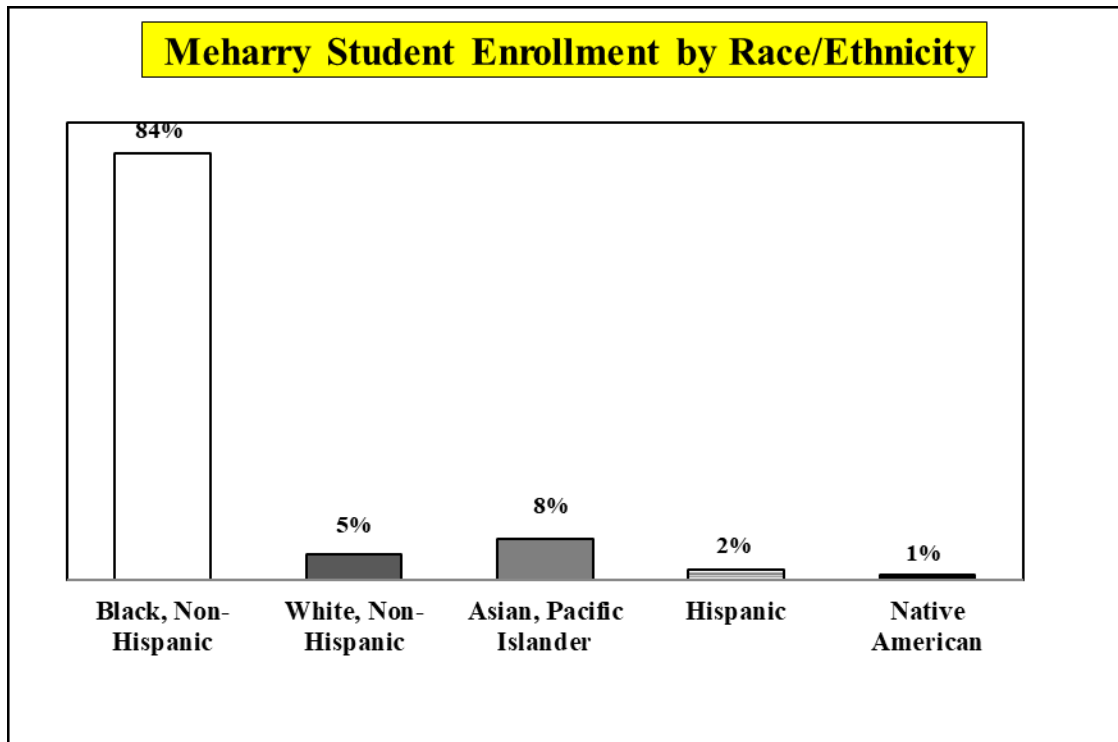

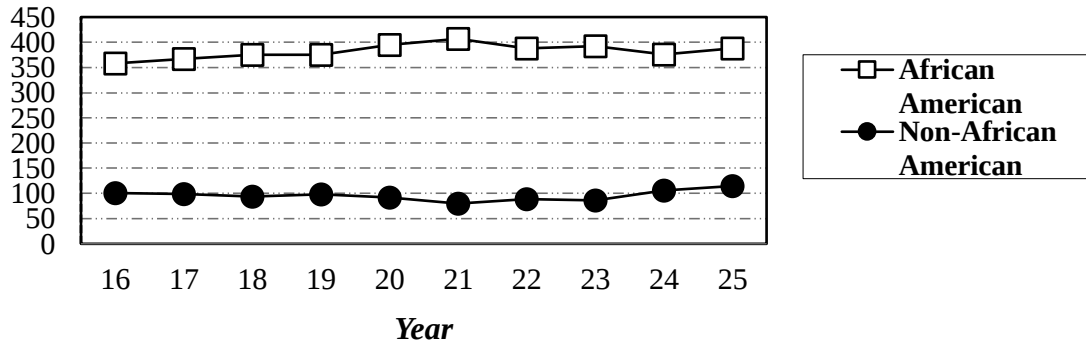

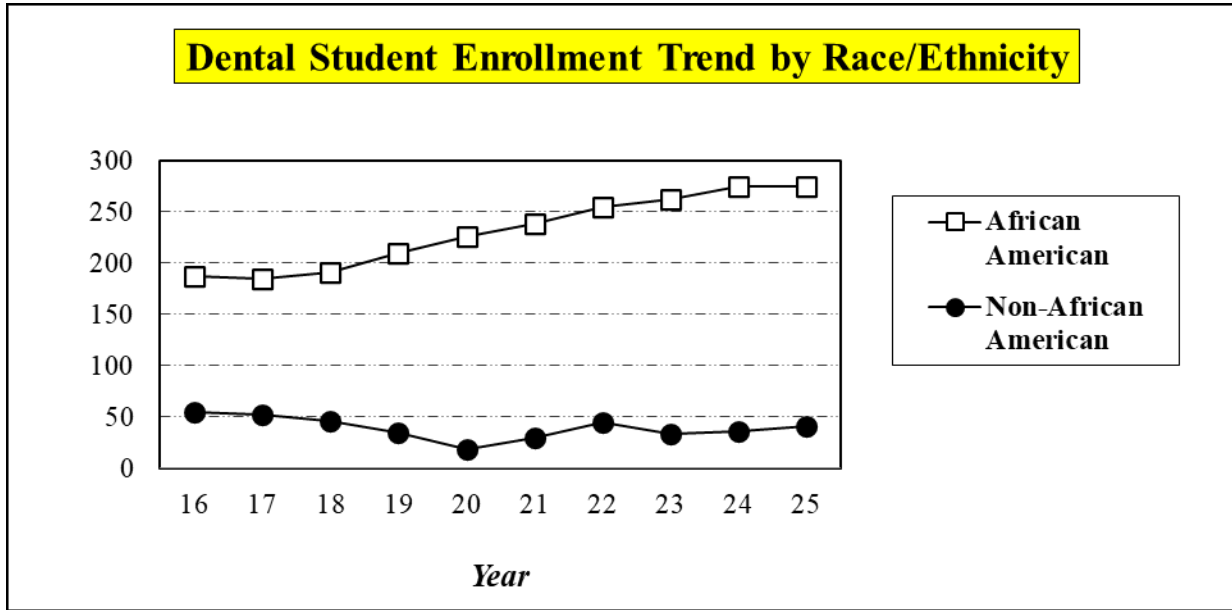
Medical Student Enrollment Trend by Race/Ethnicity

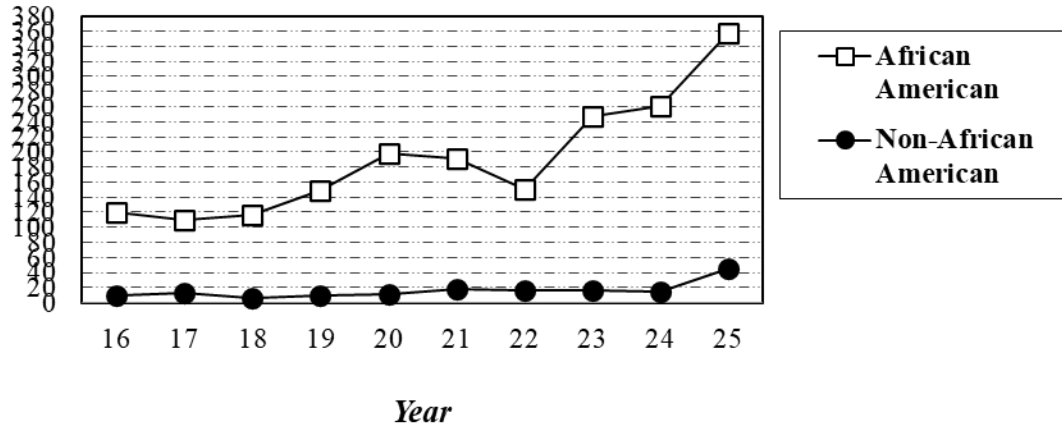

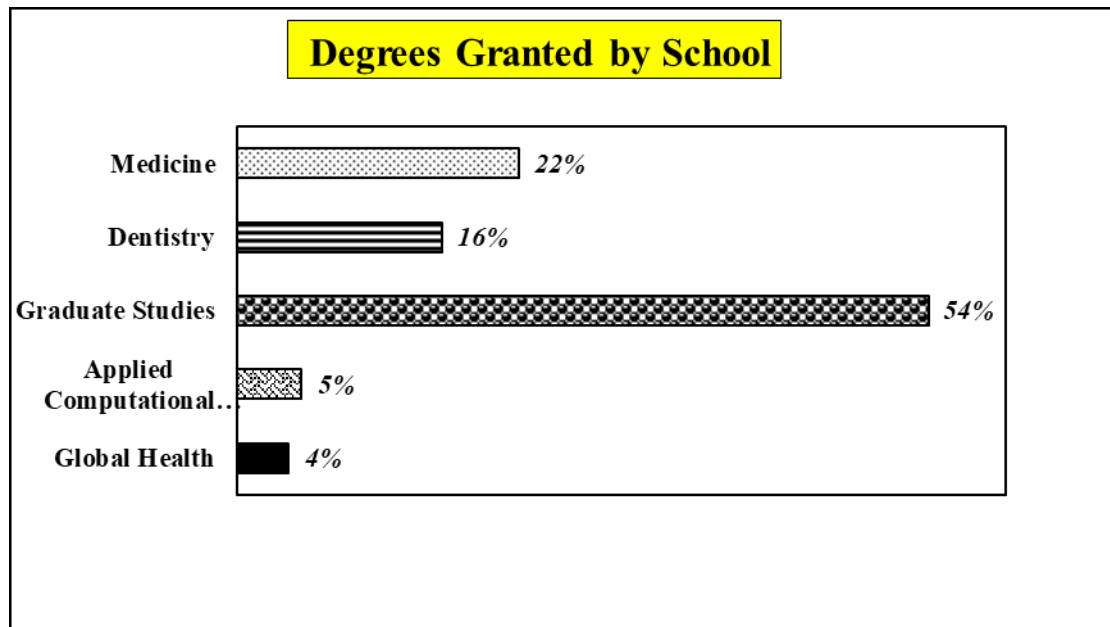
Graduate Student Enrollment Trend by Race/Ethnicity

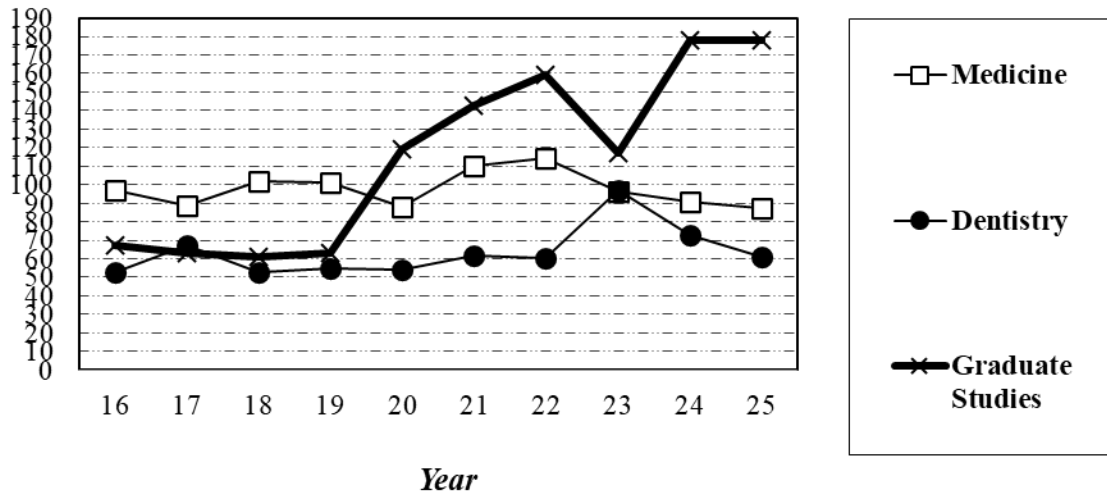

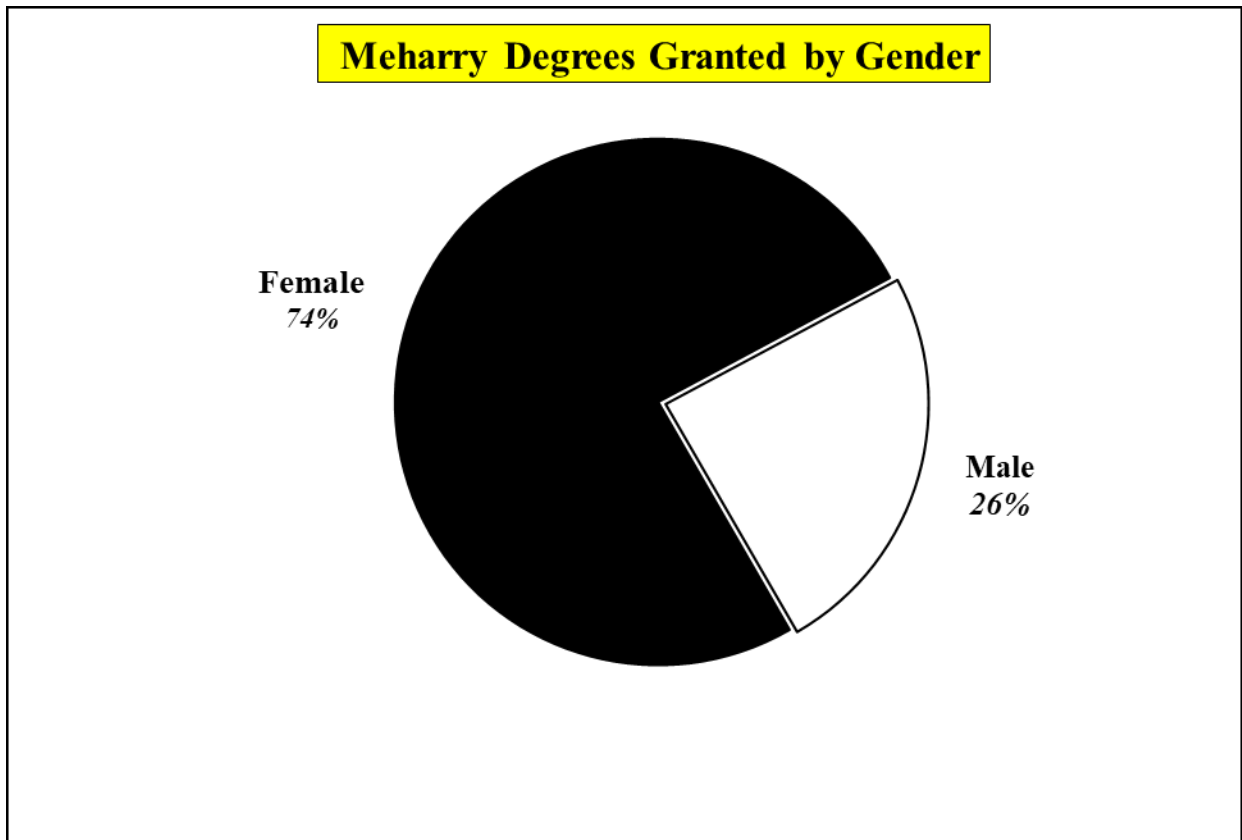

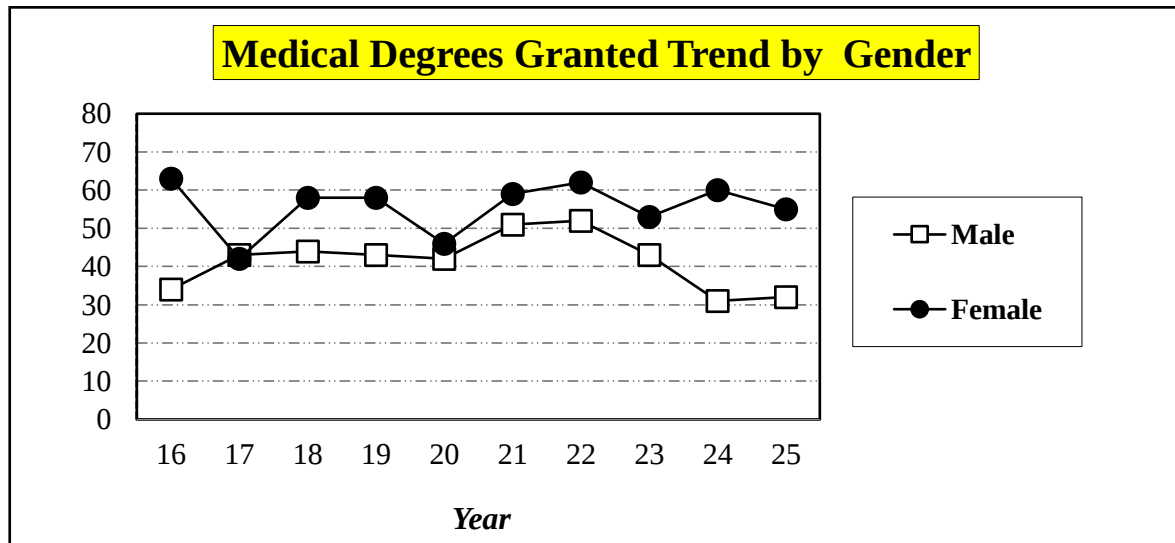
Degrees Granted, Academic Year 2024/2025

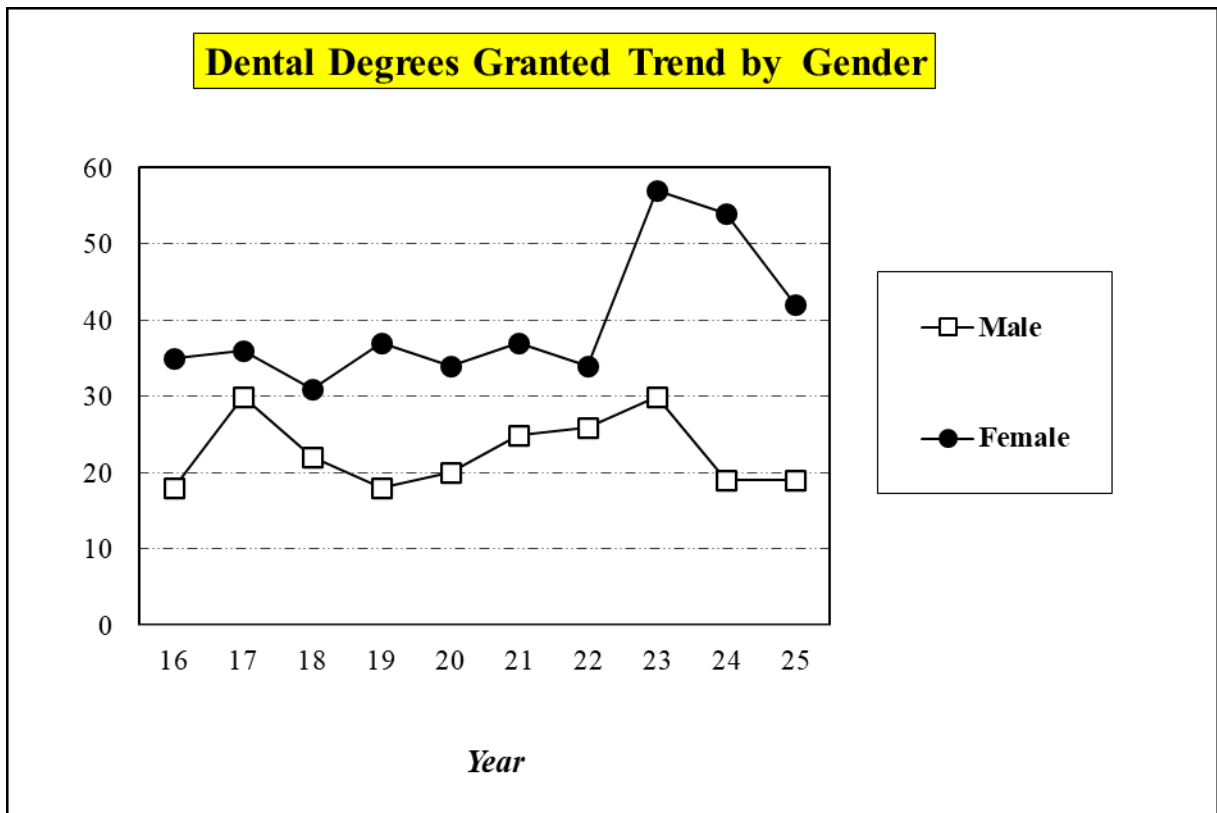

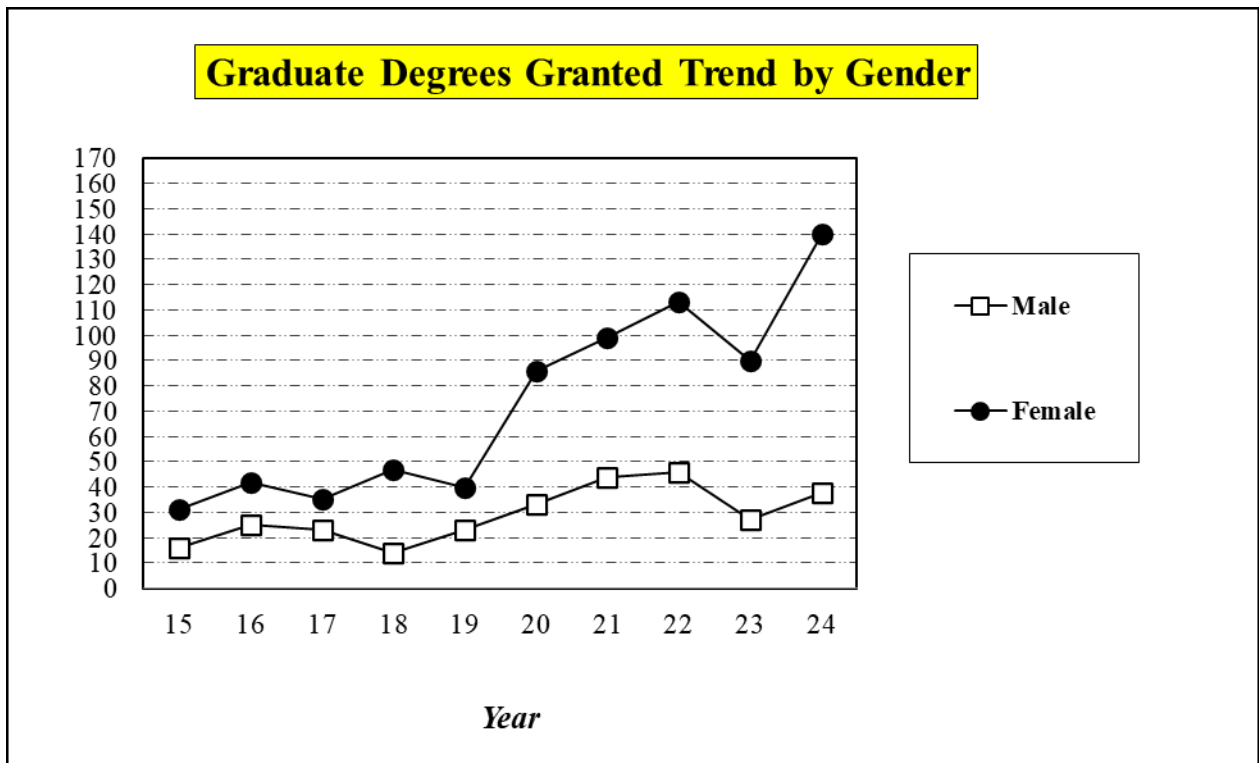

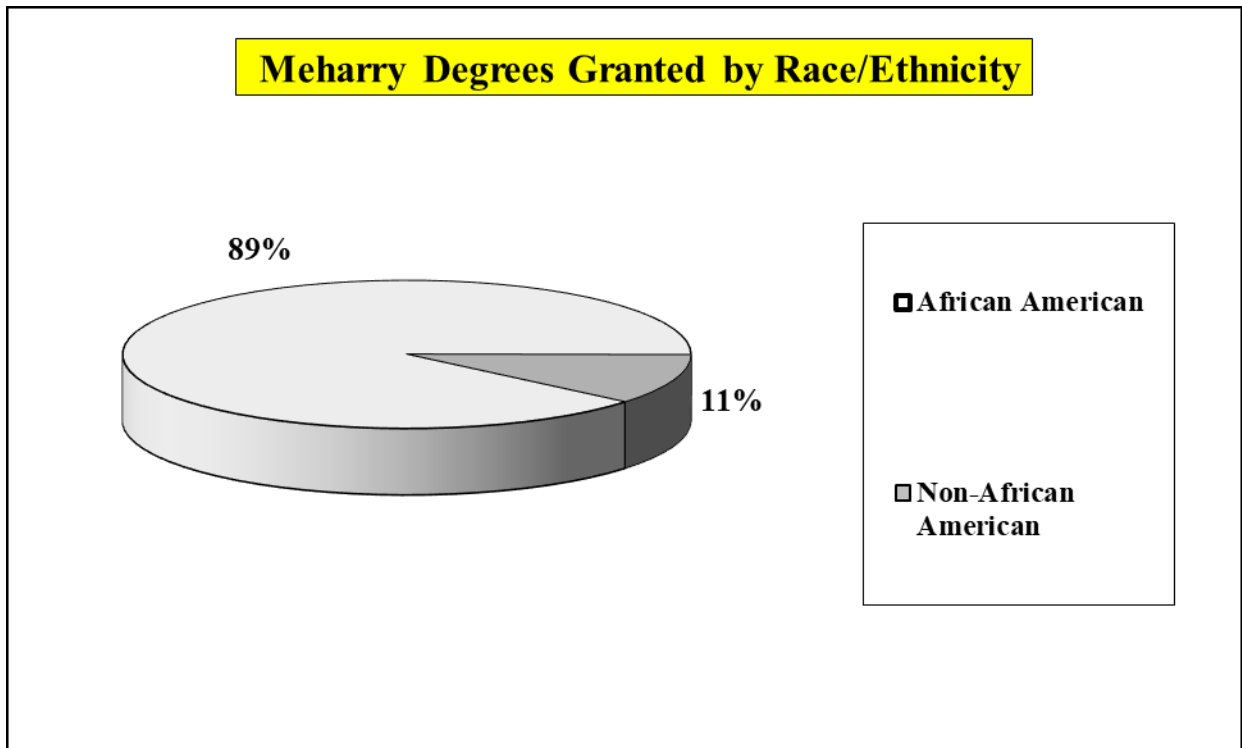
Degrees Granted, Academic Year 2024/2025

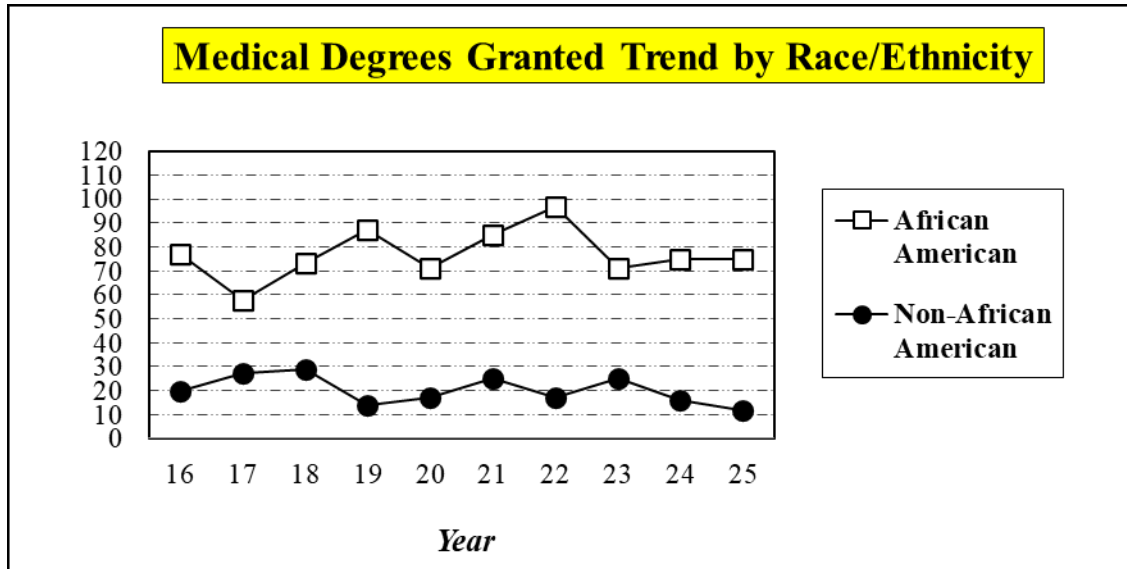
Degrees Granted, Academic Year 2024/2025

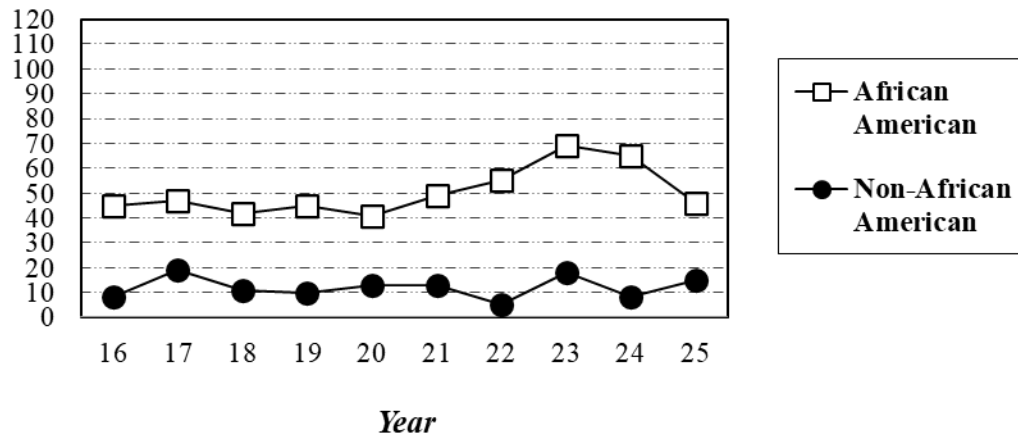

Dental Degrees Granted Trend by Race/Ethnicity

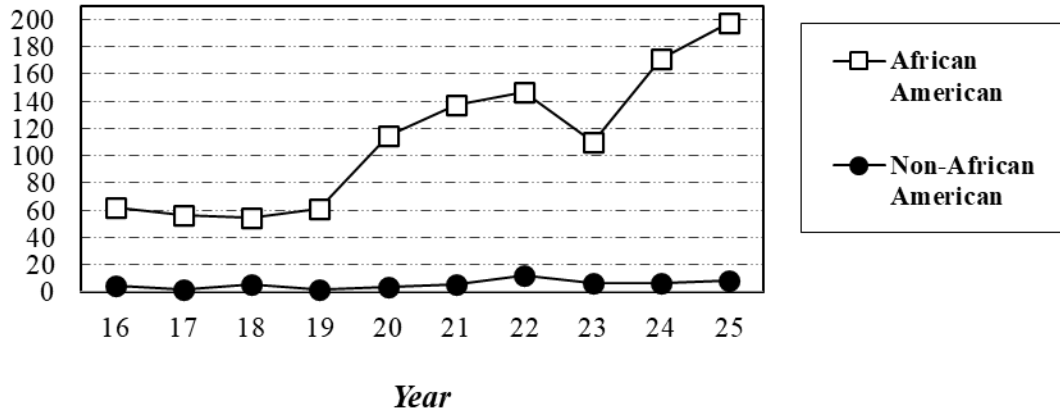

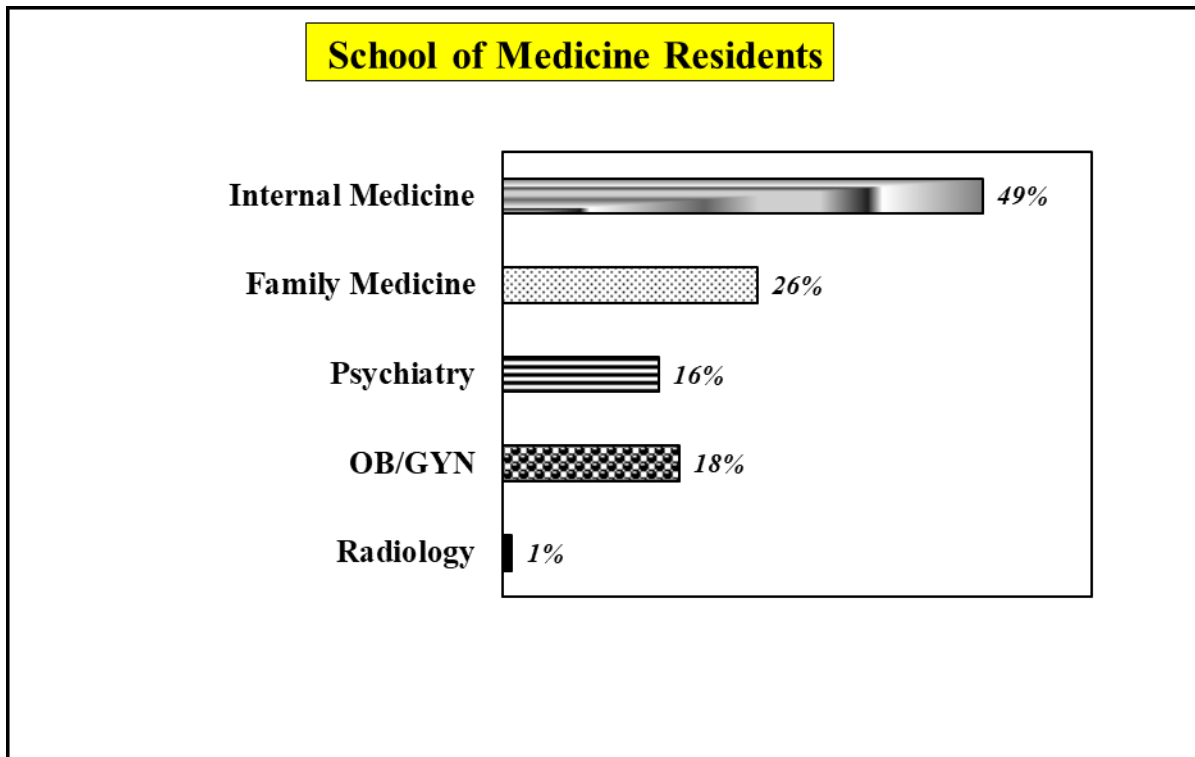
Graduate Degrees Granted Trend by Race/Ethnicity

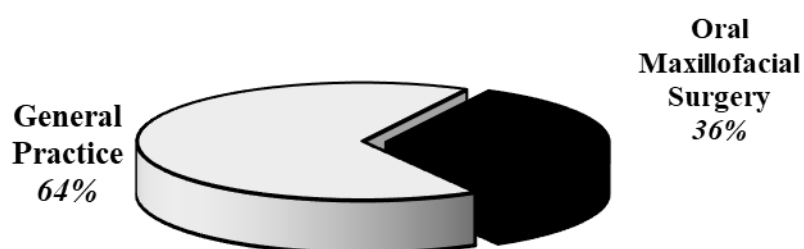

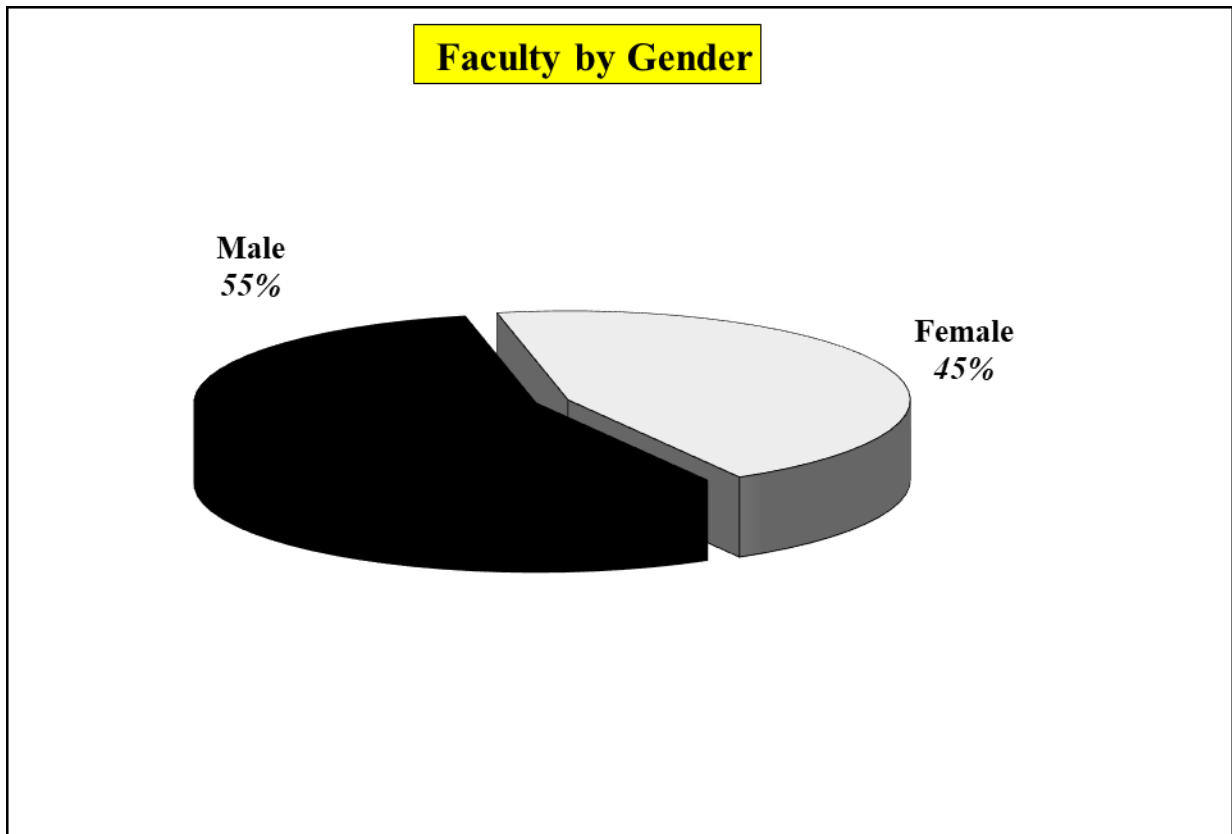

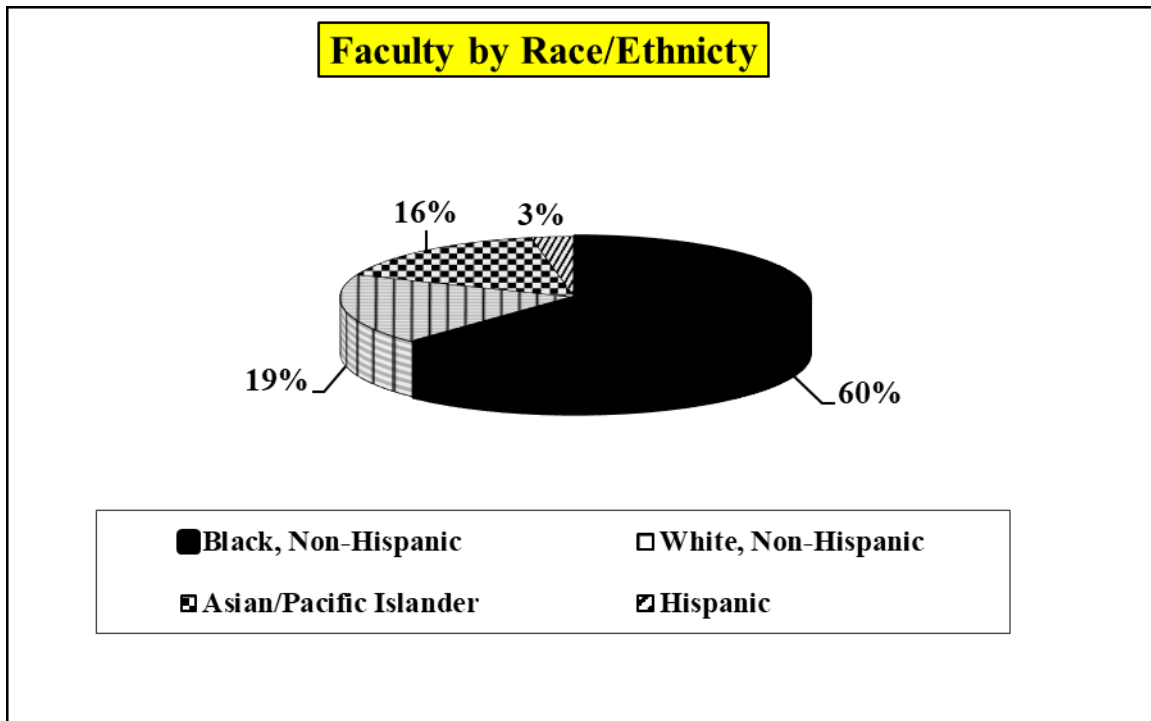

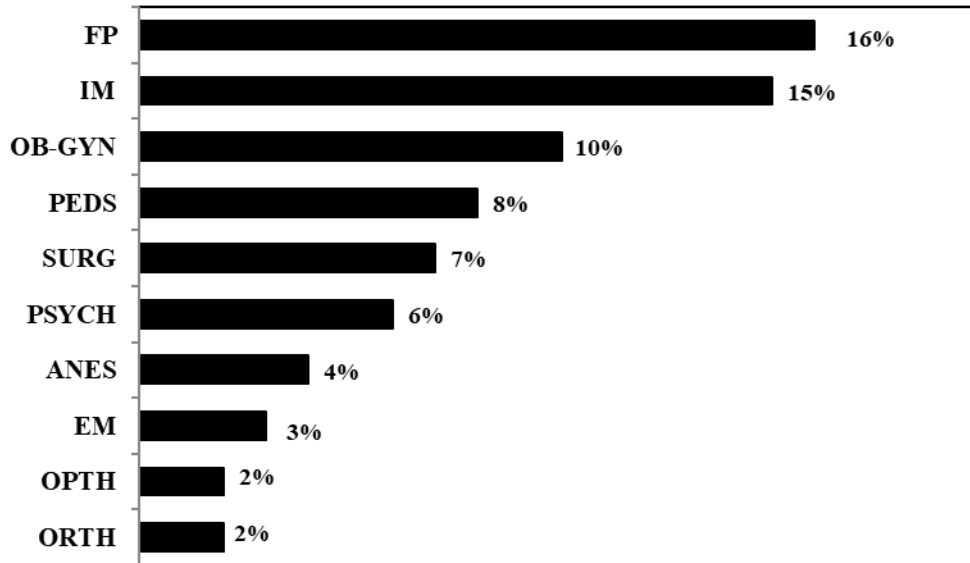

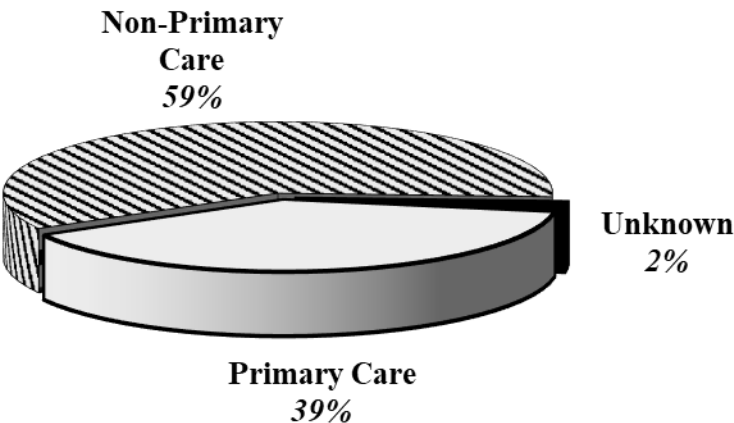

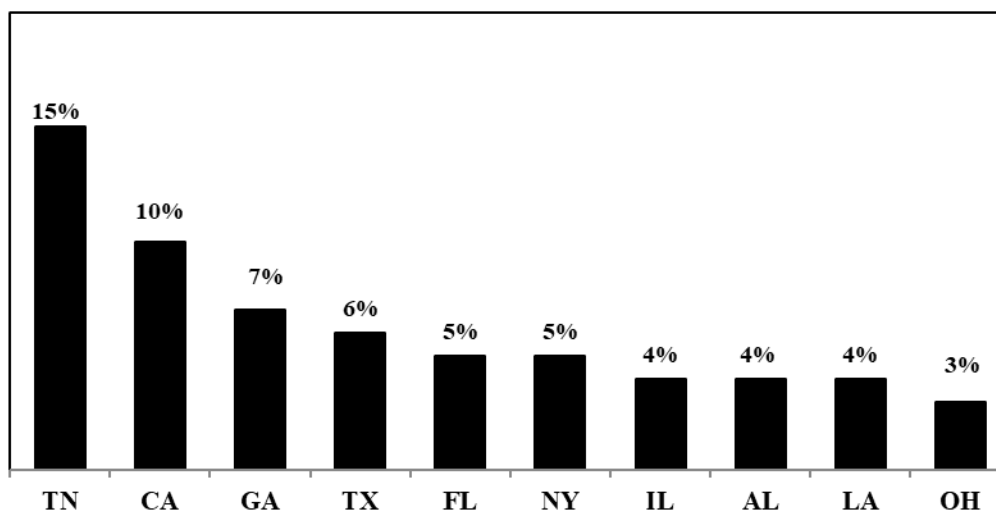

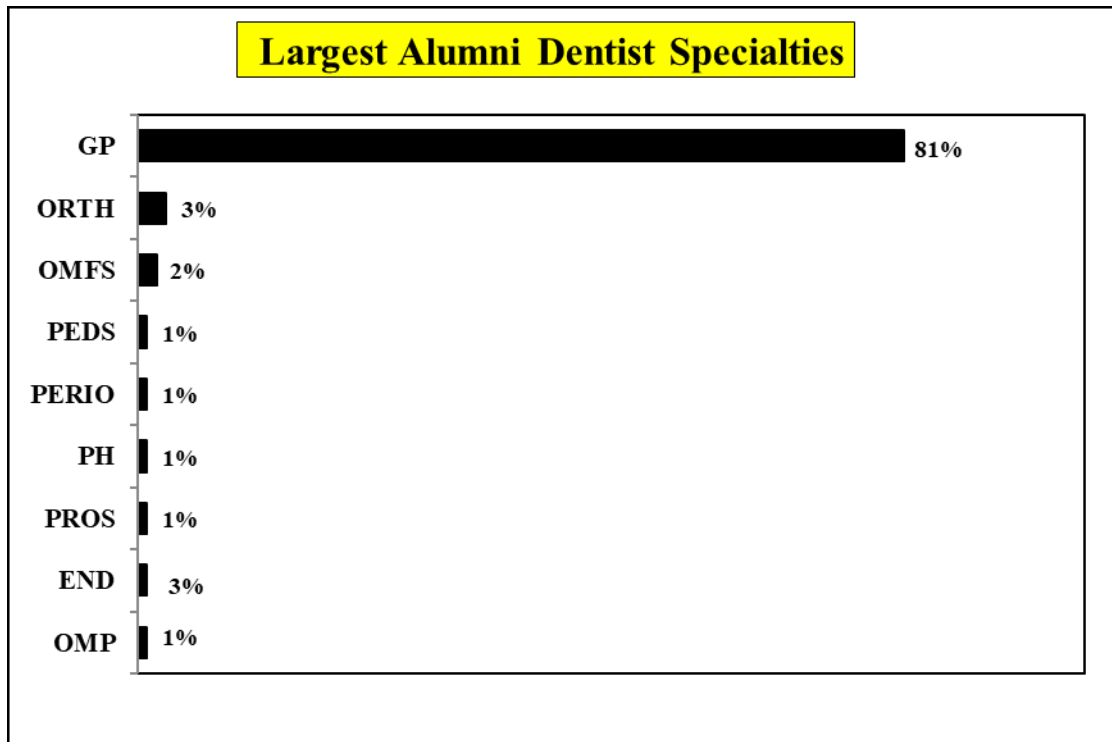

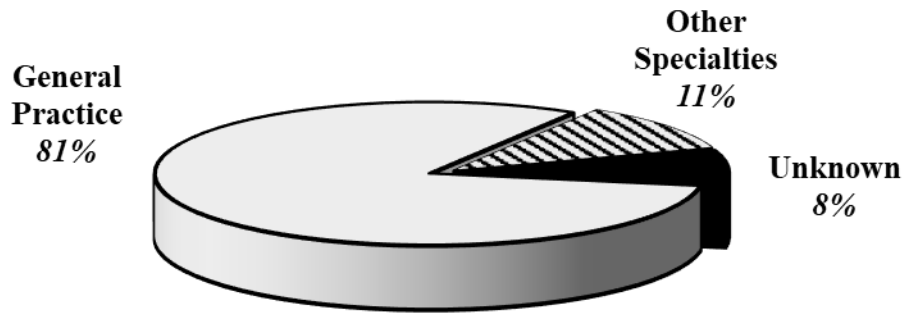

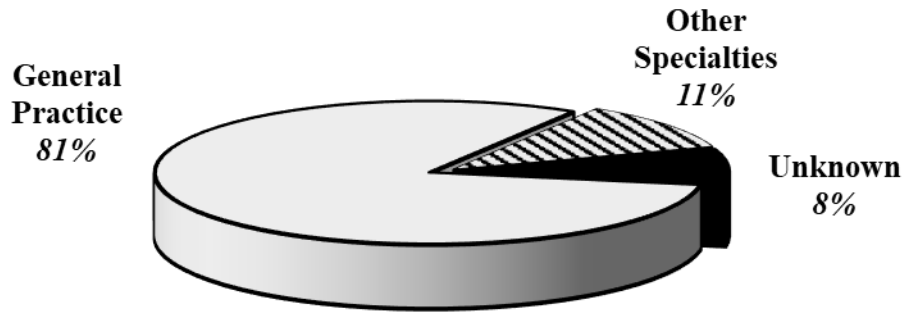

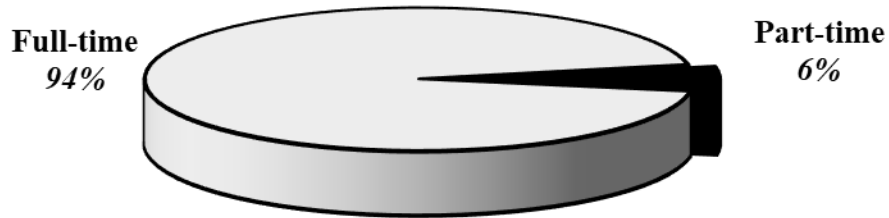

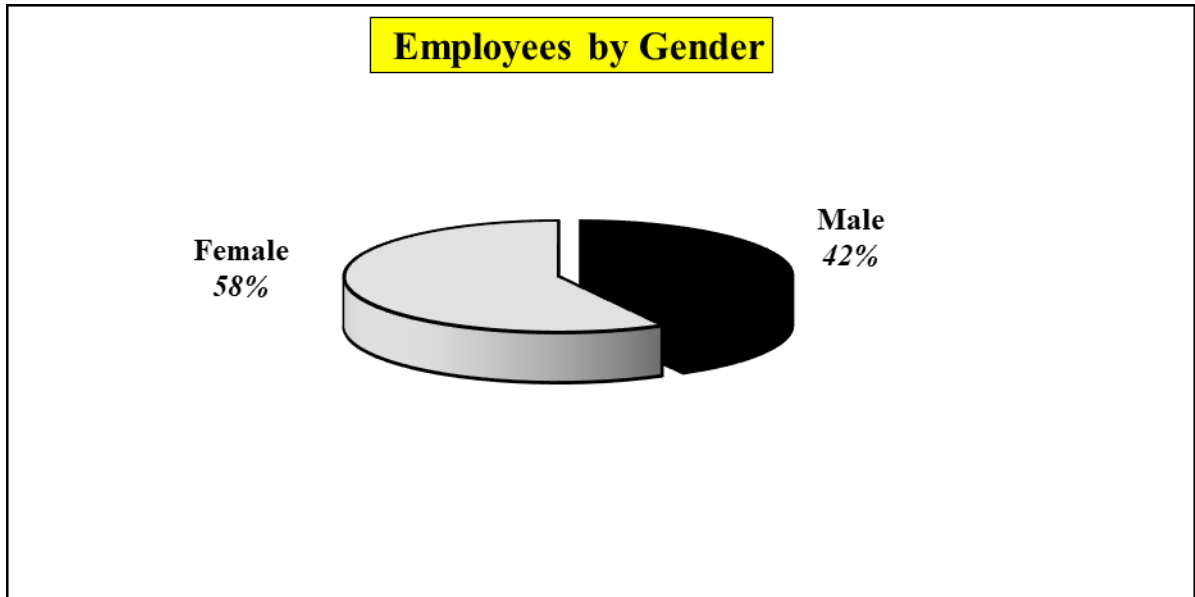
Employees by Employment Status

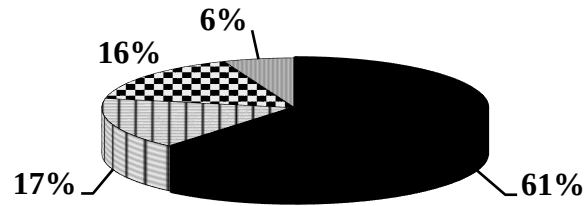
